

Dr. Donna M. Beegle is an authentic voice who speaks, writes and trains across the nation to break the iron cage of poverty. She is the author of "See Poverty, Be The Difference," and "An Action Approach to Educating Students Who Live in the Crisis of Poverty." Donna's inspiring story and work have been featured in newspapers around the nation, on local TV and on National programs such as PBS. For 25 years, Donna has worked with educators, justice professionals, health care providers, social service agencies, and other organizations who want to make a difference for those living in the crisis of poverty. She was selected 2008 National Speaker of the Year by the New Mexico State Bar Foundation. In 2010, Portland State University's School of Social Work dedicated the Donna M. Beegle Community Classrooms in her honor. In 2011, she won the Oregon Ethics in Business award.

Donna co-founded *Communication Across Barriers* with her mentor, Dr. Bob Fulford in 1989. She currently serves as President.

The Question of Poverty

The following article appeared in the Fall 2015 Communication Across Barriers electronic newsletter:

Dr. Beegle teaches us that poverty is not just a question of economic distress. Poverty impacts our neighbors' self-confidence, hope, and physical and mental well-being. Efforts to address poverty barriers must include approaches that remove

the shame, rebuild the hope, increase self-confidence, and reduce the isolation

Add to that Harvard professor Robert Putnam's latest book in which he states that, "It is sometimes difficult for the affluent to understand the texture of poverty, since they don't interact with people in poverty." Economic sorting at the neighborhood level leads to social sorting

(continued from page 2) in terms of schools, churches, and community groups. "This represents," he warns, "an incipient class apartheid." Dr. Beegle has for years shared that the social class divide in our communities perpetuates the crisis.

Professor Putnam goes on to say that with fewer social ties and connections between the haves and have-nots, it becomes harder for people to see themselves in the others' shoes: the economic gap becomes an empathy gap. When social ties weaken, stereotypes flourish. Yes, this does sound like the core issue the Opportunity Communities were designed to address. United and poverty-informed, we can fight the poverty and empower children and families.

A recent University of Essex study in the UK finds that social isolation supports poverty – another thing Dr. Beegle has been telling us for years; one of the overarching goals in her trainings is to reduce this isolation by making connections and creating opportunities! The

Social Ministries Committee here at St. Johns has a vision of adopting Dr. Beegle's Navigator and Opportunity Community here in Lewis County. The Gold Exodus by Howard Blum will be the subject of January Book Guild's discussion.



Mount Sinai. For many, it is the most sacred place on Earth-- the site where God descended to give Moses the Ten Commandments. Yet for centuries, mankind has not known its exact location. In this heart-pounding true story, award-winning journalist and bestselling author Howard Blum tells the enthralling account of two modern-day adventurers-- Larry Williams, a two-time Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate from Montana and a self-made millionaire, and his friend Bob Cornuke, a retired policemen and former SWAT team member. I'd like to let you know about a new youth ministry initiative called Team 316. Our vision for Team 316 is to build up funds to serve our Savior Jesus Christ through our ministry. Dear Muslim Sisters and Brothers,

In this season of Advent, we, your Christian neighbors, are preparing to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, who commanded that "you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart... [and] you shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:30-31, NRSV).

In our love for you, our neighbors, we are distressed by the ways in which you are being forced to bear the fears held by many in our nation. Therefore, we renew our commitment to find even more effective ways to protect and defend you from words and actions which assault your safety and well-being. We believe God calls us to resist what is divisive, discriminatory, xenophobic, racist, or violent, and we want you to look to us as allies and friends.

The global refugee and migrant crisis and the acts of terror committed in this country and around the world are challenges that demand our collective efforts, and our common prayers. Therefore, we will seek to stand shoulder to shoulder with you as agents of peace, justice, understanding, welcome, and reconciliation, for the sake of the world that God so loves.

In this holy season, when we anticipate the light that the darkness cannot overcome (John 1:5, NRSV), we are reminded of God's gift of life abundant for all. Together with you, we are committed to building a stronger society based on the dignity of each human being, the value of diversity, the holiness of creation, and the common good. We pledge our partnership, and invite our local communities into continued dialogue and engagement to this end.
